

How to Participate:

- Follow along with the devotional reading and scriptures in the digital guide to inform your prayers.
- Consecrate by fasting (see options below) and/or giving up a treasured hobby, favorite food, or other activity.

Guiding Scripture References for a Fast (not an exhaustive list):


- Daniel fasted before he received a vision (Daniel 9:3; 10:2-3).
- In Acts, church leaders fasted to know God's purpose and direction in ministry (Acts 13:2-3, 14:23).
- Jesus fasted before he began his ministry (Matthew 4:2; Luke 4:1-2).

FASTING OPTIONS:

As you follow along with us in prayer, you can also participate in the 21-Day Prayer Consecration by doing one or more of the following:

- Daniel Fast Eat no meat, no sweets, and no bread. Drink water or pure fruit juice. Eat fruits and vegetables.
- Sacrificial Fast This is a great option if you don't have experience fasting from food or have health issues that prevent you from fasting from food. This fast involves giving up things like television, social media, unnecessary spending, or hobbies.
- Partial Fast A partial fast is refraining from food during a certain window of time, for example from 6:00 am to 3:00 pm or from sunup to sundown.

Please note: if you are unable to fast for any reason, you are still invited to pray with us daily!



Make for a Successful Time of Consecration

- Pray about your fast Ask God what you should give up during the time of consecration.
- Plan to pray Identify a specific time each day that will be committed to prayer over and above your regular time of devotion then set a reminder in your phone or calendar app.
- Stay plugged in Join us each week for the Wednesday Evening Prayer Call (check your Allen Temple Email for dial-in information) to get strength and inspiration for the journey.
- Get a partner Buddy up with a friend who will hold you accountable and commit to the 21 days with you.
- Go with God If you feel led to pray about something different than the daily prompt, do it!
- Keep going We've got a habit started…let's keep going! After Day 21, we've included some daily scripture readings that you can use to begin your time of devotion and prayer through the end of January.




Exodus 3:14

Moses says to God, suppose I go to the Israelites and say to them, 'The God of your fathers have sent me to you and they ask me, what is his name? Then what shall I tell them? God said to Moses, "I am who I am. This is what you are to say to the Israelites, I am has sent me to you." God said to Moses, say to the Israelites, "the Lord, the God of your fathers, the God of Abraham, the God of Issac and the God of Jacob has sent me to you. This is my name forever, the name by which I am to be remembered from generation to generation."

The Hebrew Bible expresses I am who I am in the tongue that God spoke to Moses. In Hebrew, God said Ehyeh Asher Ehyer, which is based on the future tense conjugation of the verb *to be*. The future tense says I will be who I will be. To clear up matters for the English speaking in Hebrew grammar, ehyeh can be translated three ways depending upon context: I was, I am, and I will be, which lets us know that GOD IS PAST, PRESENT, AND FUTURE. In other words, God is eternal, without beginning and ending. The eternal is timeless, the eternal existed before time or before creation and does not have the limitations of timebound creatures nor is limited by the laws of cause and effect. Death cannot touch God who does not exist because existence occurs only in time.

I am also speaking of the invisible presence of God who never sleeps. *Have you not known? Have you not heard? The Lord is the everlasting God, the Creator of the ends of the earth. He does not faint or grow weary, his understanding is unsearchable. He gives power to the faint and strengthens the power-less (Isaiah 40:28-29).* In its essence, this name carries the reality of both the timeliness and the timelessness of the God who was, and is, and is to come.

Then God also said to Moses, "I am the Lord, YHVH, I appeared to Abraham, to Isaac, and to Jacob as God Almighty, El Shaddai but by my name, the Lord YHVH, I did not make myself known to them. Exodus 6:2 in the scripture, God reveals His sacred four-letter proper name. Because this name for God is so sacred, many Jewish persons will not repeat the name. They instead refer to God using the Hebrew word, Ha Shem. The sacred word Adonai is replaced using the Hebrew letters "yud hey vaw hey" which appear YHVH. These letters are called the tetragrammaton which in Greek means the "four letters."



Exodus 3:14

Many Biblical scholars believe that the tetragrammaton of four letters comes from the verb ha ya and therefore related to the Hebrew word for *to be* and therefore related to *I am* or *I will be*.

When we turn to the New Testament and read John 8:58, we discover Jesus creating a controversy when he says 'truly, truly, I say unto you, before Abraham was born, I Am." In John 14:6, Jesus says "I am the way, the truth, and the life, none comes to the father but by me." Again, he created another controversy with the theologians and teachers of his day. Last but not least, Jesus used seven I Am statements to define who he was on earth. He said I am the bread of life (6:35), the light of the world (8:12), the door (10:7), the good shepherd (10:11), the resurrection and the life (11:25), the way, the truth and the life (14:6), and the true vine (15:1).

The theologians and religious leaders of Jesus day did not understand the high mystery of God's condescension to become a man in Jesus. So they crucified him but death did not defeat Jesus who arose saying in Revelation 1:18:" I am he who lives and was dead but behold I am alive for evermore .Amen And I have keys of Hades and of Death ."

PRAYER PROMPT

O God: May the risen Christ live in us as living hope for a dying world Amen

GENESIS 17:1

El Shaddai, etymologically, the Hebrew words "El," meaning Lord God Almighty, and "Shaddai" from "Shad," meaning a nursing mother's breast. Lord God Almighty, who nurses and feeds us. This is a uniquely important metaphor as we should understand that God cares for us and is beneficial to us, as intimately as a mother who has birthed and is now sustaining her child's life with her mother's milk from her breast.

Mother's milk is considered to be the best source of infant nutrition. Extensive evidence has shown that breast milk contains a variety of bioactive agents that modify the function of the gastrointestinal tract and the immune system, as well as in brain development. Thus, breast milk is widely recognized as a biological fluid required for optimal infant growth and development. Recently, studies have further suggested that breast milk mitigates infant programming of late metabolic diseases, particularly protecting against obesity and type 2 diabetes.

We praise Your Holy name, for it is by Your name and power that You have charged us to walk before You in spirit, truth, holiness, and righteousness. The Bible states, Lord, You announced that You were El Shaddai when You appeared to a 99-year-old Abram in Genesis 17:1. Abram immediately fell down before the Lord. We still fall before El Shaddai!

PRAYER PROMPT:

El Shaddai, You are the Creator of Heaven and Earth and the owner of time and space—the righter of wrongs and the forgiver of sins. El Shaddai, You possess all knowledge. El Shaddai, You are the One who controls the spinning of the earth, the depth of the waters, the heights of the mountains, and the temperature of the stars in the galaxies. Besides You, there is no other.

We acknowledge that You are like a nursing mother, the Sustainer of life, and the Provider of all our needs. You are full of loving kindness, graciousness, sufficiency, protection, and a giver of abundant opportunities.

Your goodness and mercy will forever be our song of praise. You are saving us from destruction, filling our mouths with sweet fruit, healing our bodies, educating our minds, and using us for Your kingdom-building. El Shaddai, Hallelujah!

Exodus 17:15

Jehovah is actually YHWH and means Lord and Master. It is the promised and proper name of God. Nissi means flag or banner so together Jehovah Nissi means The LORD Is My Banner. God himself is our banner and victory. He gives us hope and a focus, and is the one who wins our battles.

This word occurs only once in the Bible: Exodus 17:15—Moses built an altar and called it The Lord is my Banner. This occurred in the war with the Amalekites. As long as Moses' arms, (banner, rod, or standard) were raised, victory was assured. Read the chapter for more context.

As I reflect back over my life and my walk with God, there were many times my lack of faith in God caused me to feel defeated. I was facing being fired from a company I worked for 32 years. But God used my union rep as my banner to give me victory to save my job and allowed me to retire.

PRAYER PROMPT:

Lord God Jehovah, remind us as your people, that You are our victory no matter what the circumstances are in life. Let us walk in confidence knowing and assured that You are our Jehovah Nissi our Banner. Amen!

MARK 14:35-36

"Going a little farther, he fell to the ground and prayed that if possible the hour might pass from him. "Abba, Father," he said, "everything is possible for you. Take this cup from me. Yet not what I will, but what you will."

God has many names, each illuminating Him in a unique way and allowing us to know Him more closely. Abba is not a Name of God we hear often nor was it mentioned frequently in the Bible. In fact, Abba, Aramaic for father, is seen only three times in the New Testament: once by Jesus in Mark 14:36 and twice by Paul in his letters to the Romans (Romans 8:15) and to the Galatians (Galatians 4:6). That the name Abba is used only by Jesus - the one sent so man could know and believe God and who saved us from our sins - and Paul - who, after being converted on the road to Damascus, became one of the most prolific Apostles avidly spreading the teachings of Jesus - is intimidating. Who am I to call out to God? Do I, too, have the right to call God Abba, Father?

If Jesus, himself, in one of his most human moments as he faced imminent death received solace in crying out to Abba, Father, asking Him to remove the cup of suffering, so can we. If even Paul, who once intensely persecuted followers of Jesus, assures us in his epistles that we are, indeed, God's children through the Spirit, then we should claim our inheritance. Our Heavenly Father knows us better than anyone.

He knows the number of hairs on our heads, the private meditations of our hearts, and has a calling upon our lives. Use of Abba, Father, connotes a deep connection felt through the daily intimacy knowing that God is full of grace, mercy, comfort, compassion, and patience for us, His children. He wants us to acknowledge Him and trust in His will.


Abba, Father, is a Name of God that can and should be used in our prayers and that can draw us closer to the one who created us in His image and has His hands upon our daily walk.

Call on your Abba, Father, today, and every day!

PRAYER PROMPT:

Prayer often feels daunting or complicated, but it is modeled so beautifully for us in the Word. Repeat Jesus' own prayer to the Father as He called out to Him from the Garden of Gethsemane in an hour of need: "Abba, Father, everything is possible for you. Take this cup from me. Yet not what I will, but what you will."

JUDGES 6:24

"Then Gideon built an altar there to the Lord and called it, "Jehovah Shalom" (Judges 6:24), which has been translated in English as the "Lord Is Peace".

In our society, this peace has come to mean personal peace and wellness. However, the Hebrew word "Shalom" gives us a different understanding of peace.

The word "Shalom" in Hebrew connotes social, economic, and political well-being—the flourishing of everyone. This interpretation is similar to Ubuntu, a South African worldview. Archbishop Emeritus Desmond Tutu has said that one of the principles undergirding South African society is Ubuntu – the essence of being human.

Ubuntu is a Nguni word that describes a particular African worldview in which people can only find fulfillment through interacting with other people. Thus, it represents a spirit of kinship across both race and creed that unites humankind to a common purpose. Bishop Tutu has said: "Ubuntu is very difficult to render into a Western language...It is to say: 'My humanity is caught up, is inextricably bound up, in what is yours."

Let us embrace the broader interpretation of Shalom. Let us embrace the South African view of ful-fillment-Ubuntu—I am, because we are. Let's embrace the biblical Shalom seen in reference to the well-being of others (Genesis 43:27, Exodus 4:18), to treaties (I Kings 5:12), and in the well-being of cities or nations (Psalm 122:6, Jeremiah 29:7).

Let us pray for Shalom, for peace, for justice, for an end to suffering, and hunger, for a new flourishing. Let us pray for an end to war torn Israel and Palestine; an end to war in Ukraine; an end to war in every country in our world. Let us pray for peace, Shalom, well-being, and economic justice in the streets and communities of Oakland and cities everywhere.

PRAYER PROMPT:

I am praying Jehovah Shalom—peace and well-being over our world, over our country, over our cities, over all people.


Is there something for which you have been praying fervently? Don't lose heart. Remember that our God who is "El Olam" is faithful and is our refuge.

JEREMIAH 23:6

GENESIS 1:1

As we prepare ourselves for this meditative moment of consecration prayer, allow some time for calmness and re-focus. Choose to come to God and relax in His loving presence. Take a moment to reflect on where God has brought you from in your life journey.

As the songwriters remind us with these lyrics — "You Lord, You are Worthy. And no one can worship You for me." "You are God, alone".

Now various biblical studies declare that God is referenced by many names. Each name reveals Him in such a unique way. God's Names represent His attributes, His nature. 'ELOHIM' is a common Hebrew name for God in the Old Testament.

The name denotes reference to God's 'power' and 'might'. Consider the 1st part of Gen. 1:1 "In the beginning, God ...". When you read the entire 1st chapter of the book of Genesis, there are many verses that exemplify God's 'power' and 'might'.

No doubt, someone reading (at this very moment) can reflect on the fact that your back was against the wall.

And it had not yet appeared as to how you were going to make it. BUT GOD. Yes, BUT GOD. So, we pray that God's power, God's presence, God's provisions continue to be manifested in our individual, communal and worldly affairs, trusting and believing that He [ELOHIM], will do exceeding and abundantly above all we ask or think.

PRAYER PROMPT:


(Eph. 3:20 NASB) "Now to Him who is able to do far more abundantly beyond all that we ask or think, according to the power that works within us."

We acknowledge Your presence, dear God. We exalt Your Name. [ELOHIM]. In honor of the triune God, we join (in praise) with this gospel song (paraphrased): When we speak Your name, Something happens in the room. Our hands go up. We can't wait to see what You're gonna do.

Before we do anything else, We call on You. We call on Jesus. Show up, show out, Jesus. Move how You want to move. And You can do what You want to do.

PSALM 23

The Lord Is My Shepherd, Jehovah Rohi. What does that mean. Most have heard Psalms 23 in their homes growing up, our parents taught us to memorize it. At other times we have heard Psalm 23 being read at funerals. But it is more than a scripture for funerals. Psalm 23 is about who God is and a personal relationship between a shepherd boy name David, who becomes a man and still acknowledges the divine, holy relationship between himself and his God. Knowing if it had not been for the Lord who was on his side where would he be.

David knew firsthand what it was like to tend sheep. The shepherd was to protect, provide, and feed the sheep, so he describes his relationship to God in those terms. What David had been for the sheep he was caring for God had been the same for him. "The Lord is my Shepherd" as a result, David confidently confesses, I have what I need. (I shall not want) Because God have covered all of David's needs out there on the hillside with the sheep. He realizes that he is lacking nothing.

The qualities of a true Shepherd will seek out that which is lost. Will bring back that which was driven away and bind up that which was broken. Will strengthen that which was sick. The Shepherd is also a protector and a guide for the sheep. (Ezekiel 34:II-I2, I4-I6)

Many Christians today trust God for eternity, that they have received salvation through Jesus Christ but they don't have the confidence that God can provide for them in their daily lives.

God met David's Spiritual needs. Just as shepherds give sheep rest in green pastures and refreshes them with quiet waters, so God had done spiritually with David. The cares and struggles of this world can leave us exhausted. Such times are opportunities to lean in and depend on the Lord, call out to Jehovah Rohi. He provides spiritual refreshment and restoration. He renews us in our current life.

God met David's Directional needs. He leads me along the right path. Sheep are prone to wander and become lost; get into danger that they alone cannot handle. Therefore, they always need guidance and direction from the shepherd.



PSALM 23


God met David's Physical needs. Though enemies hovered near, God fed him when he was hungry and anointed him with oil when he needed healing. Like David, we must recognize that we have only one source and that is the Good Shepherd. God never runs dry or out of what we need. That's why David said my cup runs over, God gives us new mercies each morning for the new day's journey.

God met David's Needs. David understood that goodness and mercy (faithful love) would pursue him all the days of his life. Shepherds often have sheep dogs that chase after the sheep. Goodness and Mercy will chase after us to bring us back into fellowship with your Shepherd, Jehovah Rohi, that you may eternally dwell in the house of the Lord forever.

PRAYER PROMPT

Father God, I pray that you help me to submit to "The Great High Shepherd" (Hebrews 13:30), Jehovah Rohi, our Lord, and Savior Jesus Christ. He laid down His life for His sheep (John 10:11) and through His wounds, we are healed (1 Peter 2:24). Amen!

Exodus 15:26C

The Hebrew word Rapha means "heal, "cure," "restore," or "make whole."

"Lord my God, I called to you for help, and you healed me." (Psalm 30:2, NIV) "...for I am the Lord, who heals you." (Exodus 15:26c)

It was December 9, 2010, and I had just finished an intensive, invigorating two-day training in LA. On my way to LAX I received a frantic call from my youngest sister. Our father had been rushed to the Kaiser Oakland ER and it didn't look good. She asked how long it would be before I arrived because the physician wanted to talk with us about our father's prognosis. Can you imagine the fear...the pain...the anguish...the guilt I felt being so far away at a time when my father and family needed me?

There were no available seats on an earlier flight so all I could do was sit, cry out and pray that God would step in and be with my father until I could get to the hospital. I knew the only answer was for God Himself—Jehovah Rapha—to take control of the situation. While I prayed for the medical personnel, I had to relinquish my fear and doubt to the only One that could provide the outcome we needed. Well, I made it to the hospital and my Dad while still in critical condition, was able to greet me. His team shared it was 'a miracle' that my Dad had made it through the episode and their recommendation that palliative care was the best option available. They said we had a couple of weeks—at best—before 'the inevitable.' We thanked God for His faithfulness in allowing us all to be together that night. And we continued to give Him thanks for the next TWO MONTHS we had to be with our Dad. We had time to say everything we needed to say before he went home. God healed my Dad not once, but twice. He is, indeed, Jehovah Rapha. Hallelujah!

We thank You for your wonder-working, healing power. When we face illness, even death, You are there to remind us that You are a keeper and that You do ALL things well. We acknowledge that healing takes many forms. So however you decide to demonstrate your healing power, we will acknowledge and give thanks for Your love and sovereignty.

GENESIS 14:18-20

PRAYER PROMPT:


Let us pray:

Whatever it is, pray the name "JEHOVAH SHAM-MAH" and realize that God is telling us through the bloody death and pristine resurrection of Jesus the Christ that S/He is both here and there.


PRAYER PROMPT:

The first time Jehovah Sabaoth appears in the Bible is in I Samuel 1:3, 11. There will not be one day in your entire life that God has not seen ahead and made provision for you. God's provision is always there! Let us be like Abraham and trust that surely God will provide!



Since my mother's diagnosis of dementia a few years ago, there have been times when anxiety grips my heart over circumstances that I cannot control. *Have I been a good daughter? What more can I do to show her my love? How can I provide support to my father, who is now the sole caretaker of my mother? How can I help prolong her memory? What can I do when she is combative or filled with anxiety?*

Things are overwhelming me, and I see no way of escaping. I want so desperately to have a meaningful conversation with my mother the way I once did. But in view of the circumstances, that doesn't seem possible. Tears well up in my eyes, and I find myself tongue-tied, unable to say anything of substance. Or I worry, and frustrations flood over me, and I begin to despair. Or I just give up and proceed with silence, knowing that I have failed, for the most part, to connect in a meaningful way with her.

Both physical and spiritual battles have raged within me, with conflicts that I know have touched everyone who has ever dealt with a loved one suffering from dementia. And the name El Gibbor, "Mighty God," points to the day when the enemies of dementia and Alzheimer will be vanquished and all of creation will know that Jesus is the "Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace." I cannot think of any greater comfort and confidence as I engage in the battles of my daily life.

PRAYER PROMPT:

The Lord Mighty in battle, our El Gibbor, we trust you for peace in the midst of our battle. We give thanks for You are the Conqueror of all illness and disease. You are the Lord Mighty in battle. We give You thanks and praise. Amen.

ISAIAH 7:14; MATTHEW 1:22-23

Between 2020-2022, my mother became critically ill in Southern California and I would find myself hitting the road multiple times in those two years to see about her condition and care.

I had a lot of support—my family and friends as well as my ATBC church family—but as my mom's only child there were a lot of things that fell to me and me alone.

I felt that aloneness most acutely when I would make those drives between the Bay and LA on Interstate 5. The road stretches for miles, with only small blips of life along the highway in the form of rest stops and clusters of GAS - FOOD - LODG-ING for a quick snack and a fill up to get back on the road.

There was one drive...I can't remember which... where the fear, sadness, exhaustion, and sense of aloneness overwhelmed me. At the time I was doing what we are taught to do...encouraging myself in the Lord (I Samuel 30:6). Listening to worship music, singing to the top of my lungs and zooming down the highway.

As I sang...I sensed more than just the emotion evoked by the song, I sensed and felt the presence of the Lord in the car with me. The Lord's presence was so strong I broke down in tears that blurred my vision.

The tears were a release of the pressure I was feeling. But God's presence remained assuring me that HE WAS WITH ME. Even in the middle of nowhere, and even in one of those most difficult seasons of my life, I WAS NOT ALONE!

We often reflect on Immanuel during the Christmas season. The fact that the God of the universe entered into God's own creation AS a created being to redeem creation (which, BTW, is praise-inducing on its own). But of late, I think about the GOD who rode in the car with me when I was afraid and reminded me that Immanuel – God With Us – even extends to long drives on Interstate 5.

PRAYER PROMPT:

Lord God, I thank you that you are WITH US. Not in an abstract way, but in the very real moments of our lives – good and bad, big and small! Help us to be more aware of Your presence, and trust in Your promise not just today but every day. In Jesus Name, Amen!
